Hello Readers.

Good morning everyone, we were again at Dad's for the night and today, then 8 o'clock tonight we switch with one of the others. Usually we bring enough food along, what we use for the day, and all leftovers we either feed to Pepper, Melvin's dog, or maybe some stray hungry cat that came along or take along home. Daudy eats well most days and is easy to take care of. He never complains, except this one time when Harvey's brother was here. Dad was saying something so he asked what he was saying and Daudy seemed not to notice so he moved closer to listen. He heard him say "and I get so tired of eating scrambled eggs." He will be 92 his next birthday in November.

Canning season is here with lots to be thankful for. The garden did well. Last week was pizza sauce, tomato juice, ketchup and salsa. Really I did not do it, I just helped the daughters. We used the canner tomatoes from LeAnna- Gregories tomato greenhouse, we did everything at her place using 2 turkey burners on her back

porch. Was nice to clean the mess with a water hose. We ended up with a little over 100 quarts in all. This year we tried a new ketchup recipe and believe we are going to like it. For years I have been trying to make some that tastes more like the store bought ketchup, so we will see how we like this. The recipe is on the back of the newsletter.

Yesterday we did pears - our faithful tree was loaded again. The boys got what they wanted to can then Marnita, LeAnna and I are doing the rest. We did 55 quarts total with probably 20 quarts more once they are ripe. We threw away all the small ones and those with pear scab, which is worse on a wet year and from lack of spraying. The apple trees did not have apples on so there was not much interest in keeping on spraying, but once Harvey saw all the pears we threw out, he said next year he'll spray again.

We filled a crock with sauerkraut this year again, as last year we tried filling jars and let it ferment, but it just doesn't taste the same. Years ago, we always used our wooden kraut slicer, but we picked the easy way using our Bosch slicer shredder. We then worked in the salt and packed it in our old crock, covered it with cabbage leaves and weighed it down. We'll leave it in for 3 to 6 weeks then put in jars and pressure can. I am not a kraut eater, but somehow the family learned to like it. I eat it because they say its good for your gut health. ©

Harvey and the boys are busy doing their last hay cutting and getting all the pasture land mowed to get rid of unwanted weeds. Crops look nice in our surrounding areas and before we know it the fields will be bare again. He's also making compost, which was a challenge this year. With all the rains we had it was hard to keep the moisture just right at around 45%. In a dry season he can add water, but in wet rainy seasons he often has to cover the wind rows, if they get too wet they will die out and stop working. September is a good month to apply compost when doing cover crop or apply in spring before planting.

School bells will be ringing soon. Beatrice—our boarder, a Special-Ed teacher—will be back next week. Her school parents will come and clean her living quarters the day before she comes. She was home with her parents and family over the summer months.

This week was also the funeral of a 24-year-old boy who died in a logging accident. He was the third child out of a family of nine. Life is so unsure, we don't know what the next day will bring. Our sympathy goes out to the family.

We are in the process of hanging up all fabric panels so it's easier to view them instead of searching for them. We are getting ready for the yearly tent sale. We will have lots of fabric on tables outside in the tent. Hope to see you then.



Fresh Tomato Soup

Ingredients

3 tbsp butter
1/2 cup diced onions
2 med. tomatoes, peeled & mashed
2 tsp baking soda
3 1/2 cups milk
1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp pepper
onions & pepper, sautéed

Directions

Sauté onions in butter until slightly brown. Add tomatoes to the butter and onions. Add the rest of the ingredients and heat until almost boiling.

3 1/2 cups peeled diced tomatoes 1 sweet pepper, diced 1 small onion, diced 4 tbsp vinegar 2 tbsp sugar 1 tsp oregano 1/2 tsp chili 1/2 tsp salt dash of cumin dash of garlic powder

Mix everything together. Serve with tortilla chips.

Heinz Copycat Ketchup

Ingredients

3 gallons tomato juice 6 cups tomato paste 1 tbsp onion powder 1/2 tsp allspice 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper 1/2 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp clove 5 tbsp salt 3 cups sugar 4 cups vinegar 1-2 cups Clear Jel

Directions

Bring everything to a rolling boil except Clear Jel. Dissolve Clear Jel in water. Slowly whisk into ketchup until it has the thickness you like. Let boil a couple of minutes. While still boiling, ladle into jars. Put on lid and turn ring hand-tight. Turn jars upside down until cool.
